FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners

Our Gospel reading this weekend starts with two distraught and depressed disciples leave the company of the apostles and believers in Jerusalem and head for Emmaus to get away from it all. That same day, late in the evening, they come right back to rejoin the company of the apostles and believers that they had abandoned earlier in the day, but this time, changed, the total opposite from what their mood was at the beginning of the day, for now they were full of joy and zeal. What happened to them to give rise to this dramatic turnaround? They met a stranger on the way who did not quite look like Jesus but who turned out to be Jesus after all.

Cleopas and his friend were trying to distance themselves from the scandalous disaster that befell the apostles and followers of Jesus, with the shameful death of their Master at the hands of the very Roman soldiers that they thought he had come to vanquish. But even as they tried to get away from it, they could not get their minds off it. They were talking about it all along the way. Could you imagine the sort of mood they were in as they headed for an unknown future in Emmaus? It was disappointment, sadness and deep depression all at same time. That's what happens when one is distraught, one wants to escape from it all - to forget everything and everyone, and as a result one becomes self-engrossed and self-occupied, unmindful of others.

At this time, we can all identify with Cleopas and his friend. Because of the worldwide pandemic, we all feel defeated, helpless, disappointed, sad, distraught, uncertain. We want to escape, to shut off everyone and forget everything. But no matter what we do, our minds continue to be plaqued by what if's, why's and when's.

The challenge for us is to be discerning as to how Jesus is showing himself to us now. From him alone can we find the answers. But like the two disciples on the road to Emmaus, right now, Jesus is approaching us on the common road that we all tread, showing himself to us in an unfamiliar face that we might not right away and easily recognize. But how can we recognize him?

Cleopas and his companion shared with the stranger all the way through. Not only were they ready to share their confidences with him, but they went all the way and shared their meal and shelter with him. It was in the process of this sharing that the moment of disclosure occurred and they suddenly realized that the one whom they had accepted all along as a helpless stranger was indeed Jesus, the answer to all their heart's questions. In the same manner, the only way that we will recognize Jesus this time is to find ways to share - share time, share resources, share kindness, share encouragement, and share faith.

We hope that all of you are well and staying safe, and that all of us will be able to celebrate the Easter Season together in joy and in person soon!

We have been sending weekly updates to all of our Program's families via email since the period of social distancing started. Please contact us at <u>faithfomation@sscmdp.org</u>. Our Office has been <u>CLOSED</u> due to the pandemic, so this is the best place to reach us with general questions.

Sacraments Updates

As all of you by now have seen, and as stated above, the new social distance end date, as announced by the State, is Friday, May 15th. This is right in the middle of our Sacrament Season. After advice from the Diocese and in accordance with this new social distance ruling, <u>the decision has been made to post-pone all First Holy Communions, to a new date to be announced</u>. Once we are able to monitor the curve and receive both State and Diocesan updates, we will then be able to reschedule the First Holy Communions, and First Reconciliations, for those who did not yet receive. The light at the end of the tunnel here is that <u>First Holy Communions are not cancelled; They are postponed</u>. I will have new dates for everyone as soon as we get clearance for social distancing, which I hope and pray is as soon as humanly possible.





In regard to Confirmation, Confirmation for us is scheduled to take place on Friday, May 29th. Since this day falls exactly two weeks after the proposed social distance ending date, as of right now, in this point in time, Confirmation Day is still on as scheduled. <u>This may change</u>. We will be updating everyone with all information as soon as we receive it.

With social distance regulations and safety procedures constantly changing, this causes our Office, and every Faith Formation Office in the Diocese, to cancel and push back plans as soon as we make them, only to start over again and have those plans scrapped, too. Although a lot is uncertain for all of us right now, what I can guarantee as a sure thing to everyone is our dedication to your children and your families, and that our first priority is to keep everyone who would normally be in attendance for these special and sacred days safe and healthy. Please continue to pray for our world as we navigate all of this together.

"Quarantine" Means Forty: What Does Forty Mean?

Over these past few weeks, I've been thinking a lot about Biblical "characters", especially as I've been teaching adult Formation classes for our Diocese. Facing this time of uncertainty has led me to re-read passages of people in the Bible who have been through serious hardship. As I was reading, I remembered a special number that was a common theme: **Forty**. Forty is a number in the Bible that symbolizes trial, tribulation, hardship, and waiting. However, if you look at the numbers that give us a product of forty, you see five, which symbolizes grace, eight, which symbolizes new beginnings, four, which symbolizes creating something new, and ten, which symbolizes perfect completion. The word "quarantine" itself comes from the root of the Latin word *quadrāgintā*, meaning "forty".

Now think about these people of the Bible: Noah was quarantined with his family on the ark during the flood for forty days, which resulted in a rainbow, and a world cleansed from sin. When Moses led the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt, they wandered the desert for forty years before they got to the Promised Land of Canaan. Moses stayed at the top of Mount Sinai alone for forty days to be with God before God gave him the Ten Commandments. Jesus fasted and was tempted by Satan in the desert for forty days, which then resulted in our Salvation by His Resurrection from death. All of these Biblical situations also show us that forty is a time of change, which results in these "characters" coming out better, stronger, and full of faith. ALSO, we are currently facing COVID-19 in the year 2020; 20 + 20 gives us FORTY. May we remember that like Noah, Moses, and Jesus, even though we all feel helpless and alone as we are quarantined, change and a new beginning is coming. From it, may we also come out better, stronger, and full of faith.

The resurrection was for Jesus the dividing line between earthly life, on the one hand, when he was limited to the form of a male, Jewish body and on the other hand, risen life when he is no longer limited in this way. The risen Christ now appears in all types of bodies: male and female, white and black, young and old, rich and poor, handi-capped and non-handicapped, native and immigrant, Catholic and Protestant, Christian and Muslim, Jewish and Buddhist, liberal and conservative, republican and democrat, and so on and so forth. Though we may see those who are different from us as strangers, today's gospel challenges us to start seeing them as companions on the way. When we reach out to them in hospitality we reach out to God and attract a blessing to ourselves. Perhaps one positive thing that this pandemic makes us realize is that we are all in this together, no exemptions and exclusions, and the only way we can get through this is if we all work together hand in hand.

And so, let us pray today for the grace to overcome our crippling fears, for the courage to reach out with open hearts and open hands to those who are different from us, knowing that even though a lot of things happening today may feel like Jesus is not there, he is in fact reaching out to us, perhaps as a stranger that we may not readily recognize, but he joins us and walks with us on the road to our own Emmaus.
