ALL SAINTS' DAY

Every year the Church recalls the example, witness, and prayer of the holy women and men who have been identified by the Church as Saints. These saints are more than just role models; they are family members with whom we continue to share relation, in a bond of prayer, called the Communion of Saints. Every year when we celebrate this day, the Gospel we proclaim recalls for us Jesus' teaching about happiness, the Beatitudes. We quickly note in this reading that none of those Jesus names as "blessed" or "happy" are expected . . . the poor in spirit, the meek, the persecuted. Jesus' blueprint for happiness reflects little of what the world might call happiness.

FROM THE PASTOR

What does Jesus mean when he uses the word "blessed?" This word is sometimes translated as "happy" or "fortunate" or "favored." In other words, Jesus is saying that divine favor is upon those who are poor, who mourn, who are persecuted. This might have been welcome and surprising news to the crowds who heard Jesus that day.

The Beatitudes can be understood as a framework for Christian living. Because of this, it is natural that we proclaim this Gospel on the Feast of All Saints. Saints are people who lived the spirit of the Beatitudes as Jesus lived. On this day, we too are challenged to model our lives on the spirit and promises of the Beatitudes.

THE DIOCESAN CHAPTER 11 UPDATE AND HOW OUR PARISH IS AFFECTED

Please read the more extensive letter published in last week's bulletin. You may access a copy of the bulletin online at our parish website at www.sscmdp.org. The following is the abbreviated version that was read at every Mass.

Our Parish is being asked to contribute **\$49,202** to the settlement of all cases. It is a large amount, but we must be made aware that we have 4 lawsuits connected with the CVA filed against our parish and the old school. Now, we really do not have any savings in the bank and are currently operating on a deficit because of the considerably large operating expense for such a big parish. And yet, the amount of contribution is relatively or comparatively manageable. But we need to manage it together as a parish.

I am therefore launching a campaign to ask **1000 families/individuals to contribute \$50 dollars** to pay off our contribution. Of course, we will be grateful to those who are able to give more and will still appreciate whatever amount you are able to give from the generosity of your heart. You can do this by adding the extra amount to your regular monthly contribution or issuing a separate check with the memo Chapter 11. As usual you may drop it in the collection basket or online. But note that we need to submit the contribution by the end of this month (October) so our legal representatives can be ready for the court confirmation scheduled for December 3. I may need to find a way to borrow money. But if we can raise it by the end of the month, it would be for the best, so we don't have to pay any interest.

As of this writing, we have raised 90% of our required contribution. If you have sent your help, we appreciate you. If you haven't, know that we have one last weekend to raise the remaining 10% and that we have to submit what is required of us in about 3 days. Then I would have to assess if we may need to find a way to borrow the remaining.

COMMON QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

1. What has happened to the Church on Long Island?

The New York State Legislature passed the Child Victim's Act in 2019 which allowed historical lawsuits to be filed for child sexual abuse, regardless of how many years ago the alleged abuse occurred. The number of lawsuits filed against our Diocese, our parishes, and schools was too many to resolve one at a time in court. Trials could have devastated our parishes and resulted in many abuse survivors receiving little or no compensation because of a "first come, first served" system. The legal costs alone involved in taking these cases to trial over years would have been a significant burden on each parish. Chapter 11 (Bankruptcy) allowed the Diocese and parishes to settle all the lawsuits equitably while continuing the work of the Church.

2. Why does my parish have to declare Chapter 11 Bankruptcy?

For any individual or organization to resolve past liabilities (historical matters for which it could be sued), it is necessary to obtain a "release / discharge" in bankruptcy. Therefore, the only way that parishes could protect themselves in the future from lawsuits involving matters from the past, was to obtain the discharge afforded through bankruptcy. All parishes are completing the same process. Thankfully, our parishes are able to participate in a significantly abbreviated Chapter 11 process.

3. Does Chapter 11 Bankruptcy mean that my parish is in jeopardy or closing?

No. There are no parishes closing in the Diocese of Rockville Centre as a result of this Chapter 11 process. Parish bankruptcies were agreed upon between the parties to the case and will be completed within 48 hours, closer to the end of 2024. This process is not expected to affect parish work or ministries.

4. Did Catholic Ministries Appeal donations get used to settle lawsuits?

No. Catholic Ministries Appeal (CMA) donations support the ministries of the whole Church on Long Island, and their use is considered restricted, meaning, they could **not** be used to settle lawsuits. CMA donations support our parishes, our schools, our outreach programs for the poor, the training of future priests, and care for our retired clergy. That is why the work of the CMA is more important than ever. The Ministries Appeal is here to help support our parishes and schools, especially now that we are emerging from this difficult time in our Church's history.

5. Did donations to my parish get used to settle lawsuits?

The fact is all the resources that the Church has are the result of the support of the faithful over generations. Even returns on investments and parish rental incomes would not have been possible if people had not donated the resources to build parishes and make investments. So, in one sense: Yes.

The settlement came from many different sources: insurance, savings and reserves, investments, the sale of Diocesan Chancery (Office) building, etc. Parishes made their contributions so that any present or future historical lawsuits against the parishes could be resolved once and for all. The settlement contribution from the Diocese and parishes is fixed and agreed upon. So, donations made to parishes now, serve the mission of the parish.

Feelings of anger over the abuse scandal and its ongoing effects are justified and understandable. We may not have caused this scandal, but we have all suffered its effects. That is what sin does to the human family, causing suffering for all. But as Saint Paul wrote, "Where sin abounds, grace abounds more." (Romans 5:20)

The settlement will bring an end to this painful time for our Diocese. It will bring some measure of compensation to abuse survivors whom we pray will find healing and reconciliation. It has brought an end to lawsuits that could have devastated our parishes. It will secure protections for our parishes from future historical lawsuits.

In the end, the Church is Jesus Christ. He is our only true treasure. But the physical buildings in which we worship God, learn about our Faith, and serve the poor, require donations to build and maintain. With bankruptcy behind us, we will pray and work together for a time of resurrection for the Church on Long Island, continuing the saving mission of Jesus Christ.

Do you know someone who has not been baptized and is interested in becoming a member of the Catholic Church?



Respect Life

<u>Equality Amendment (EA)</u> The proposed "Equality Amendment" (EA), which would have created a de facto state right to abortion in the NYS constitution, is off the ballot for this fall. Thanks to a lawsuit brought by courageous State Assemblywoman Majorie Byrnes (R-Caledonia), a courageous trial court judge, State Supreme Court Justice Daniel Doyle, removed the EA from the ballot on procedural grounds. Justice Doyle's ruling is expected to be appealed.

The EA was passed by the Democrat majority in the state legislature without any hearings and without an advisory legal opinion from the state attorney general. Justice Doyle found that the EA is null and void because it was passed without following the step-by-step deliberative process the state constitution mandates.

Pro-lifers should still spread the word about the dangers of the EA if it is ever approved by New York voters.

What the Media doesn't want you to know about the proposed equality amendment is it would have created a constitutional right to "reproductive healthcare and autonomy" for "persons." Notably absent from its text are the words and phrases "MINOR," "PARENT," "CONSCIENCE," and "LATE TERM." The proposed bill stated: NYS Legislature bills: A1283 and S108A "No person shall be denied the equal protection of the laws of this state and any subdivision thereof. No person shall, because of race, color, ethnicity, national origin, age, disability, creed, religion, or sex, including sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy, pregnancy outcomes, and reproductive healthcare and autonomy, be subject to discrimination in their civil rights by any other person or by any firm, corporation, or institution, or by any agency or subdivision of the state, pursuant to law." This "Equality Amendment" could empower unaccountable state judges and bureaucrats to DISCRIMINATE against BABIES, EVEN IN THE NINTH MONTH OF PREGNANCY, by denying their right to life by endorsing their killing by abortion, including painful late term abortion, and by infanticide through intentional neglect if the baby is born alive after an attempted abortion DISCRIMINATE against social workers, educators and health care workers, INCLUDING DOCTORS AND NURSES by denying them state licenses if they refuse to do abortion referrals. DISCRIMINATE against PARENTS by denying parents the right to require their consent for their minor age daughters being given an abortion while requiring the consent of parents for their minor age daughters being given an aspirin. DISCRIMINATE (IN FAVOR OF ABORTIONISTS) by awarding abortionists the PRIVILEGE of operating without the health and safety regulations lifesaving surgeons and pharmacists must adhere to. This "Equality Amendment" can empower unaccountable state judges and bureaucrats to regulate, harass, fine and prosecute public pro-life witnessing and crisis pregnancy centers out of existence as violators of the "Civil Right" of "Reproductive Healthcare and Autonomy."
