Today the Church celebrates the **Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome**, the

Living the Liturgy

The Feast of the Dedication of THE LATERAN BASILICA IN ROME



This Sunday, November 9, the Church celebrates a special feast: the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome. At first, this may sound like a local Roman feast, but in fact, it belongs to the whole Catholic Church. It reminds us that we are all united as one family of faith, built on Christ, our foundation.

The Lateran Basilica is **the oldest and most important church in the world**. It is the cathedral of the Bishop of Rome, which means it is the Pope's own church, not St. Peter's Basilica as many think. Its full name is *The Archbasilica of the Most Holy Savior and of Saints John the Baptist and John the Evangelist at the Lateran*. Because it was built on land owned by the Laterani family, it became known simply as St. John Lateran.

The church was first built around 324 A.D. by Emperor Constantine, the first





Christian emperor, soon after Christianity was legalized. It became the first public Christian

church ever built. For centuries, the Popes lived there, and many important councils of the Church took place within its walls. Though it was damaged and rebuilt several times through history, it always remained the "mother and head of all churches in the world."

So why does the whole Church celebrate this feast? Because it is not only about a building but it is about what the building stands for. The Lateran Basilica represents the unity of all Catholics around the world, gathered under the shepherd of Rome, the Pope. It reminds us that our faith is not private or individual: it is one family, one Church, one home in Christ.

As we honor the dedication of this ancient basilica, we give thanks for all our churches: places where heaven touches earth through the sacraments. But even more, we remember that each of us is a living temple of God's presence.

May our hearts always be clean, welcoming, and full of faith, so that Christ may dwell within us.

"The Church is not made of stones, but of souls united in Christ."

News from Near and Far

<u>World Mission Sunday</u> — <u>October 19, 2025</u>: On October 19, the Church celebrated *World Mission Sunday*. Pope Leo XIV encouraged all parishes to participate, reminding the faithful that their prayers and support help spread the Gospel, build churches, and provide for the health and education of mission communities.

Apostolic Letter on Love for the Poor: Earlier in October, the Holy Father issued Dilexi te ("I have loved you"), an apostolic letter calling the Church to renew its commitment to loving the poor by placing education and human development at the heart of the Gospel.

<u>Historic Ecumenical Prayer — October 23, 2025</u>: On October 23, King Charles III of the UK visited the Vatican and prayed with Pope Leo in the Sistine Chapel. This historic moment symbolizes growing Christian unity across traditions.

<u>Sixty Years of Nostra Aetate</u> — <u>October 28, 2025</u>: On October 28, the Church marked 60 years since *Nostra Aetate*, the Second Vatican Council's declaration on relations with non-Christian religions. The Holy Father emphasized that dialogue is a "way of life" grounded in faith and respect.

<u>75th Anniversary of the Dogma of the Assumption</u>: This year marked the 75th anniversary since Pope Pius XII solemnly defined the dogma of the Assumption on November 1, 1950, declaring that Mary was taken body and soul into heavenly glory. This teaching highlights her unique share in Christ's Resurrection and remains a source of hope.

The Catholic Origin of Pumpkin Spice

Did you know that the world's favorite fall flavor actually has Catholic origins? Long before pumpkin spice lattes and autumn candles became popular, a 12th-century Benedictine nun - Saint Hildegard of Bingen—was writing about the very same

blend of spices.

Saint Hildegard, one of only four female Doctors of the Church, was a remarkable woman known for her wisdom in theology, music, medicine, and nature. In her writings, especially her medical work *Physica* (written around 1151–1158), she described the joyful and healing effects of mixing cinnamon, nutmeg, and cloves, the same ingredients we now call "pumpkin spice."

She wrote: "Take some nutmeg and an equal weight of cinnamon and a bit of cloves... Eat them often. It will calm all bitterness of the heart and mind, open your

heart and impaired senses, and make your mind cheerful."

In time, this combination of spices became popular for baking and cooking, especially in recipes using pumpkins. By the 20th century, the blend was sold as "pumpkin spice," and later inspired the famous fall beverages and desserts we enjoy today.

So the next time you sip your pumpkin spice latte or bake a pumpkin pie, remember Saint Hildegard, the saintly scholar who first saw these spices as **gifts from God** to bring warmth, joy, and cheer to the human heart.

Responding to God's Call

The Life of Venerable Father Anthony Vincent Gallo



After his early years in the orphanage, where the seed of vocation first took root, Anthony Vincent Gallo embraced his calling with quiet resolve: "With the help of God, I will prepare myself to become a holy priest." Drawn to the Congregation of the Priests of the Sacred Heart, whose mission is to honor and repair the Sacred Heart of Jesus, Anthony found a spiritual home aligned with his ideals of holiness and service.

His formation took him from Albino to Guastalla and Bologna, where he excelled in his studies, often sacrificing recreation for academic rigor. The northern climate and relentless effort, however, began to undermine his fragile health.

During World War I, Anthony served with distinction despite poor health. A poignant moment on Christmas night 1918 found him walking through snow and ice for hours to receive Holy Communion, exemplifying his deep devotion amid hardship.


Entering the novitiate in 1919, Anthony dedicated himself to a year of prayer and mortification. His superiors noted his exemplary interior life and humility, confirming his growing holiness. Healso continued his studies, earning his Licentiate and pursuing theology with the same dedication. Yet illness gradually worsened, marked by fatigue, tremors, and insomnia. Though tempted to rest, Anthony accepted his sufferings with a radiant spirit, telling a confrere, "The more I suffer, the more flowers I want to offer Jesus."

Doctors diagnosed a severe nervous collapse with no cure, but Anthony was undeterred. A specialist called him a "Saint Anthony, martyr of suffering," acknowledging the sanctity born from his trials. Despite his infirmities, he made Perpetual Vows and received minor Orders. His illness, however, prevented his ordination with his classmates in 1926.

In 1927, seeking divine aid, he journeyed to Lourdes. Though not physically healed, he returned with deep spiritual consolation, declaring, "We have not received the grace of being cured, but of great comfort, light, and resignation."

As his condition deteriorated, Anthony returned home at his Superiors' advice. Tragedy struck with the death of his beloved mother in 1928, whom he comforted with faith until her final moments. Her memory sustained him in his darkest hours.

Although ill and dispirited, Anthony's vocation remained firm. Finally, on December 14, 1930, at the Church of St. Nicholas of Monteforte Irpino, Anthony was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Petronelli



of Avellino. This joyful yet solemn occasion marked the fulfillment of his lifelong dream. Though his health remained frail, his spirit soared with gratitude and humility. His second Mass, offered at the cemetery in suffrage for his parents, reflected his deep love and devotion to family and God.

Living Stones in God's House

This Sunday we celebrate the Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica, the Mother Church of all Roman Catholic churches. More than honoring a building, this feast reminds us that we are the Church: living stones built into a spiritual house (1 Peter 2:5).

- How can I help others feel welcomed and valued?

May we continue to build a Church not of bricks and mortar, but of love, justice, and solidarity.
